THE THEME

Why One Table

For two years, “one table” has described how VisionCast works: no keynote stage, no breakout rooms, no expo hall, everyone in one room. This year we make the case for why.

The risks that now define private-sector resilience, from geopolitical rupture and climate disruption to supply chain fragility and a shifting federal landscape, do not belong to any one company, agency, or sector. They cross every line at once. Each one is enormous precisely because it cannot be solved from a single seat.

The format was never the point. The problems are the point, and they are exactly why the table has to be shared.

One table. Bold ideas. Real solutions.

Built for Working, Not Watching

VisionCast 2026 is a working session, not a lecture series. Sessions are sized to the problem rather than forced to a uniform length. Facilitation is applied where a conversation needs steering and withheld where the room can carry itself. Expect whiteboards, not slide decks; most of the value comes from the group thinking out loud together and mapping problems in real time.

What you will find

- One room, 40 seats, both days
- Chatham House Rules, so people can say what actually happened
- Deep-dive sessions of about 90 minutes on the cross-sector problems that need room to breathe
- Sharp 30-minute sessions built around a single hard question
- A two-hour working session where the room builds something PSEMA will deliver year-round
- A working emergency operations facility as the venue, not a hotel ballroom

What you will not find

- A keynote stage
- Breakout rooms
- An expo hall
- A vendor pitch disguised as a session

A hundred people is a panel discussion. Forty is a working session. The room stays small on purpose.

What Is On the Table

Every session is written as a problem that cannot be solved from a single seat. That is the theme in practice.

People out of harm's way

Evacuating and accounting for employees when conflict abroad strands operations.

Locked out by the climate

Keeping work moving when extreme heat, flooding, or smoke makes the workplace unreachable.

Seeing around the corner

Organizational risk when climate, geopolitics, supply chain, and cyber compound at once.

Building the PSEMA Training Program

A working session to shape what PSEMA delivers year-round.

What the research is telling us

Pressure-tested against the practitioners who live the risk.

The two days open with the case for the theme and close on where the network goes next, including what PSEMA has planned as it heads toward a milestone December.

The full agenda, with session times, publishes on the VisionCast page in August.

THE ROOM

Who Is At the Table

VisionCast draws the people who have to make the call when something is actually happening:

- Corporate continuity, security, and risk leaders from national and Fortune 500 organizations
- Emergency management directors from the private sector's largest operators
- Government and nonprofit partners who coordinate directly with business during disasters
- Supply chain, logistics, and critical infrastructure leaders

These topics sit at C-suite and continuity-director altitude, and the room is built to hold that conversation. If you are the person your organization calls at four in the morning, this is your room.

THE HOST

Global Medical Response

There is a reason VisionCast 2026 is in Lewisville, Texas. Global Medical Response is a PSEMA member, and it is opening the doors of its Office of Emergency Management to host us in a working emergency operations environment, run by the people who use it.

That is business helping business when it is not a slogan: a member organization putting its own space, its own team, and its own time behind a conversation the whole sector benefits from.

Make the Case

Two days out of the office is a real ask. Here is the argument, in the terms your leadership will use.

You come back with relationships, not a binder. The value of this network shows up during an activation, when the person you need is someone you already know. Nobody wants to be exchanging business cards mid-crisis.

You hear what actually went wrong. Chatham House Rules mean people describe the incident as it happened, not as the press release described it. That is not available at a conference with a communications team in the room.

You see how your peers are structuring risk right now. Not a framework from a deck, but the working whiteboard of how forty organizations are handling compounding threats this year.

You help build something you will use. The two-hour Training Program session means what PSEMA delivers to your organization for the next year is shaped by the people in the room.

You are in a real operations center. The venue itself is worth the trip for anyone who has wondered how a national response organization runs its coordination.
